1. Executive Summary

In 2025 the Kharkiv Human Rights Protection Group (KHPG) continued to use the comprehensive and holistic approach to collecting information about international crimes committed by Russians, documenting and analysing these crimes, and helping law enforcement agencies investigate these crimes. It also includes rendering legal, psychological, monetary, humanitarian, social, and medical assistance to victims of these crimes, as well as informing Ukrainian and international society about these crimes.

On the base of this approach, KHPG has developed the following direction of activities.

Documenting international crimes allegedly committed in course of full-scale Russian-Ukrainian war. In 2025 KHPG jointly with over 20 Ukrainian Human Rights NGOs collected information on 12 212 incidents of allegedly committed war crimes and entered it into the database produced by KHPG. In addition, KHPG entered 5336 cases to the second database for strategic litigations.

Promoting accountability of the perpetrators of international crimes. We have provided primary legal aid to 11 493 people through KHPG Public Reception Offices (PRO) in Kharkiv, Kyiv, Sumy and Mykolaiv and 355 one-day field receptions as well as KHPG hotline. 2235 crime reports to the Ukrainian law-enforcing bodies in interests of victims of war crimes have been prepared. We have carried out secondary legal assistance within the framework of the activity of the Strategic Litigation Centre (SLC) in 3753 criminal proceedings. 80 applications have been sent to the UN mechanisms on human rights. 933 applications have been sent to the UN Working Group on Enforced Disappearances Furthermore, KHPG lawyers prepared, published and disseminated two submissions to the Prosecutor Office of the International Criminal Court and five analytical reports.

Rendering other kinds of assistance to victims of war crimes: psychological, monetary, etc. In 2025 11 psychologists carried out 4437 one-hour sessions in order to render psychological assistance to 929 victims of war crimes in Kharkiv, Kyiv, Mykolaiv and Lviv regions. Furthermore, KHPG has developed referral networks in these four regions. In addition, 2070 victims of war crimes received charitable assistance in the amount of UAH 3000 each.

Carrying out awareness raising campaign in Ukraine and others. KHPG has continued to support a site of the Tribunal for Putin (T4P) initiative with seven versions in Ukrainian, Russian, English, French, German, Italian, and Spanish. The site is functioning since September 2022. KHPG disseminated own and partners' analytical articles with summarising the war crimes, crimes against humanity and genocide allegedly committed by the Russian military, protests the war in Russia, etc through sites and pages in the social networks. In addition, KHPG has created «Oral histories» – recording, transcribing and distributing in Ukrainian and English interviews both inside and outside of Ukraine from eyewitnesses of the events. Additionally, part of these interviews translated and disseminated in 7 languages.

Advocacy activities with national authorities, as well as with the ICC, UN, EU, CoE, OSCE, institutions based on the above activities. KHPG and its partners have enricised on efforts to organise bilateral and multilateral meetings between themselves, other Ukrainian partners and international stakeholders, in order to report on the results of documentation efforts, share their analysis and legal qualification of the crimes that have been committed, present evidence and argue for the adoption of resolutions, statements, declarations establishing or prolonging accountability mechanisms and enacting countermeasures – sanctions, to deter future violations.

KHPG charitable activities. In 2025 KHPG carried out four charitable programmes for victims of war crimes.

2. The approach of the Kharkiv Human Rights Protection Group to documenting crimes and helping their victims

KHPG has formulated a comprehensive and holistic approach to collecting information about international crimes committed by Russians, documenting and analysing these crimes, and helping law enforcement agencies investigate these crimes. It also includes rendering legal, psychological, monetary, humanitarian, social, and medical assistance to victims of these crimes, as well as informing Ukrainian and international society about these crimes.

The collected information is entered into the database, whereby the event location is recorded (geodata or addresses of the crime), the date of the event, the type and description of the event, the object of the attack, and preliminary qualification of the crime under the Rome Statute of the ICC. Additionally, we enter the personal data of the victims, witnesses, and perpetrators, if they are known, and evidence of the crime in the form of media files (photos, videos), text documents, etc. Many organizations collect this information, including members of the “Tribunal for Putin” initiative. These NGOs cover the entire territory of the country. Today, the database contains about 120 thousand incidents of crimes committed by Russians. Based on our research and collected information, we preliminarily classified these atrocities as war crimes, crimes against humanity, and genocide.

Sources of information for the database are open information on the Internet and direct contact with victims and witnesses. Direct contacts make it possible to collect information and file a report about the crime to law enforcement agencies to investigate it. Therefore, it is essential to find victims of a crime and interview them to populate the database, open an investigation, and provide the victim with the necessary assistance.

In addition to the work of the KHPG reception desk, an important tool of such search is monitoring visits to settlements in the de-occupied territory, during which KHPG lawyers interview the victims and find out what types of assistance they need. In advance, the local self-government body announces the date and time of reception, and its social protection department employees call the victims and invite them to a meeting. The monitoring team includes two lawyers who receive people in parallel and a psychologist who provides rapid psychological assistance. At the same time, the fourth team member makes photo and video recordings of the destruction in the settlement for the database. Our team visits the same settlement as many times as necessary to interview all the victims living there.

In 2025 KHPG made 355 such monitoring visits.

Following the priorities of the Office of the Prosecutor General, the KHPG lawyers prepared statements of crimes for national law enforcement agencies regarding:

- dead and wounded civilians;
- illegally deprived of liberty and missing civilians; and
- prisoners of war and civilian prisoners, subjected to torture in captivity and then released.

KHPG lawyers help the police, and the State Security Service of Ukraine conduct investigative actions. Such assistance includes questioning victims and witnesses, organizing forensic medical examinations, identifying corpses, identifying suspects, etc. In particular, our lawyers identified nine perpetrators among Russian prisoners of war.

We offer victims of crimes comprehensive help. It includes humanitarian assistance (provision of one-time cash support, clothing, medicines, and household items), legal assistance (provision of legal advice, reimbursement of attorney services for representation in national bodies of Ukraine and Russia, international bodies, such as the UN Human Rights Committee, the UN Working Group on Arbitrary Detentions, the International Criminal Court), and psychological aid (payment for long-term and short-term psychotherapeutic consultations).

Collected information about crimes is summarized as analytical articles and submissions to the Prosecutor’s Office of the International Criminal Court. In 2025 we have already submitted two such submissions (more detailed information see in the section 4).

However, it is not enough to transfer this information only to specialists and those investigating crimes, both in our country and abroad. We must reach the mass consumer of information not only in Ukraine but also in other countries. That’s why we created a special war crimes site in seven languages: Ukrainian, Russian, English, French, German, Italian, and Spanish.

We also have the “Voices of War” project. We interview victims and witnesses of war crimes and other people who have something to say about the war — soldiers, volunteers, psychologists, journalists, artists, and musicians. We already collected about three hundred of these interviews on our website and our YouTube channel. They are informative, tell a lot about what is happening in our country, and show the level of mutual assistance and solidarity between Ukrainians. They also demonstrate what kind of terror the Russian military instills in the occupied territories and how brutally they treat peaceful citizens. We translate the best interviews into other languages. Voices of war are now heard in nine languages.

Also, we are probably the only organization in Ukraine that regularly publishes information about Russian protests against the war in Ukraine. We have published a weekly digest of such protests since mid-March 2022.

Finally, it is necessary to stress that the individual components of our approach are very closely related to each other and support each other. We are interested in extending this approach to all ten Ukrainian regions where fighting occurred and made it in 2025.

3. Documenting international crimes allegedly committed in course of full-scale Russian-Ukrainian war

In 2025 KHPG jointly with over 20 Ukrainian Human Rights NGOs collected information on 1 2 212 incidents of allegedly committed war crimes and entered it into the database produced by KHPG. In addition, KHPG entered 5336 cases to the second database for strategic litigations.

Let's consider the development of the database and actions aimed at improving data security.

Until 24 February 2022 the database was a simple structure MySQL database, located on an internal server in the office of the KHPG, and designed to convert the data from spreadsheets to this database, and edit and add data manually using a simple web interface. Developed by KHPG software allowed to check the correctness of writing home addresses, find and specify repetitions of the same episodes and protect personal data by automatically encoding and storing them in the database in encrypted form. The personal data were reversibly encrypted (AES_ENCRYPT), using a key that could be changed at any time. In this database KHPG kept data on over 16800 civil victims of the first period of the war and on over 22 thousand destroyed civil objects during the period 2014-2018. The database also allowed the output of statistical reports on predetermined requests. The software provides a selection of episodes for a given period of time, location and type of events, both individually and in combination of any set of these features and allows you to generate reports showing summary information in tabular form (distribution of episodes over time) location, type of loss and type of event) and graphically – on maps based on Google Maps.

After 24 February 2022 the task was to bring the database to an external server to provide remote access to work with many documenters. For this purpose, we created a user authorization module with different access rights (guest, documenter, editor, lawyer, administrator, with and without the ability to view personal data). And the database itself was placed on the MIROHOST server (Ukrainian company) and the backup, now working as an online copy of the database on the server IONOS (German company). Servers of both companies are physically located in Europe. In case of problems on the main server, you can quickly switch to work with the database on the spare server, where data is synchronized with the main server daily. The choice of Ukrainian hosting as the main one is due to the convenience / speed of interaction with the database of documenters in Ukraine.

At the first stage of operation of the database, factors limiting its use for work in new conditions and solving new tasks were identified, so in the future and up to now, both the structure of the database data itself and the web interface for working with this database are constantly being improved and developed in accordance with the emerging tasks of documenting war crimes. In other words, the base in its development adjusts to the limited possibilities of documenting crimes in wartime, the increased threat to data security, and, given the need for different classification and statistical processing of entered data at any given time. In this connection, the following stages of work followed.

Access to the folder where media files and documents (in the form of binary files) related to the "testimonies" section are stored has been closed. I.e., you can view or download files only after logging into the database and entering the encryption key of personal data.

Access to the media files and documents (binary files) located in the "Case" section of each episode is completely prohibited to anyone except the lawyer handling the case.

The "hard binding" of data types to database tables was changed. Instead, it is possible to expand the categories entered the database without changing the structure of the database, but only by changing the configuration parameters, i.e., introduced the use of a simple "category builder" for the input data.

A module was created to automatically record all changes in the records entered by data documenters. The history of changes cannot be changed through the database interface, and they are stored in the database in encrypted form. I.e., the storage is carried out on the principle of "black box".

The module of automatic fixation of views of individual episodes and personalities was created, if they were not viewed by the documenter who created the records or by the lawyer conducting the TIP. Storage of viewing history - according to the "black box" principle.

The mechanism of two-factor authorization, which implies after the usual login with a username, password and encryption code of personal data - followed by the subsequent entering of an additional code sent to the e-mail address of the user.

A module for logging all login attempts with failed authorization has been added, and when a certain limit of "authorization errors" is reached, the ability to continue such attempts is closed for the IP address of that user. In addition, the time intervals between authorization attempts have been increased. Unblocking the IP address through the database system administrator.

In order to enhance data security and integrity, the software modules of the database interface are periodically analysed, and obsolete or outdated modules are removed from the database, and inactive users are periodically deleted and/or user passwords are changed.

Almost all technical recommendations from Digital Security Lab to protect the base from potential hacker attacks have been implemented.

4. Promoting accountability of the perpetrators of international crimes

This activity supposes identification of victims of international crimes, initiation of investigation and prosecution of these crimes in Ukraine and in cooperation with international, such as UN Committee on Human Rights (UNCHR), UN Working Group on Enforced Disappearances and Arbitrary Detentions (UNWGED) as well as International Criminal Court (ICC). KHPG realised it through direct communication with victims and witnesses of the international crimes and various assistance to victims: legal, psychological, social, charitable and other.

Communications were carried out by electronic appeals to the KHPG on the website, pages on social networks and appeals at the reception at the KHPG offices in Kharkiv and Kyiv and at field receptions in settlements on the de-occupation territory for 355 one-day monitoring visits to Kharkiv, Kyiv, Chernihiv, Poltava, Donetsk and Sumy regions. A total of 11493 people applied, all of them received primary legal aid in the form of consultations. Many who applied received other forms of assistance. In addition, KHPG hotline processed 2,747 phone calls. All callers received consultations.

In 2025 KHPG lawyers presented interests of victims in the 3753 criminal proceedings. See more detailed information in the following table:

Also, KHPG lawyers prepared and sent 80 individual complaints to the UNCHR and 933 applications to the UNWGED. All complaints were approved. We look forward to a consideration of these cases and relevant actions of the UN bodies.

Finally, the entire KHPG team has completed a book “Experience of the Kharkiv Human Rights Protection Group. 2022–2025” (<https://library.khpg.org/1738165112>). KHPG has many years of experience in human rights protection efforts, but Russia’s full-scale aggression has significantly changed its priorities and approaches to its work. In addition, all employees of the organization, being Ukrainians, have been affected by the devastating impact of the war. In the book, employees of the organization share their experiences of human rights protection work during the war.

This book identifies the main areas of work and their substance. In particular, we describe the effort to document war crimes and to create a single database containing generalized information about them. The submissions prepared by the organization’s lawyers and sent to the International Criminal Court are cited. Their subject matter is the most dangerous international crimes, including genocide against Ukrainians as a national group. The analytical aspect of the work is presented, including materials on the most important and painful events. Considerable attention is paid to one of the most difficult areas of the organization’s work — assistance to victims and survivors of crimes committed and continuing to be committed by the Russian Federation. These include trips to areas where hostilities are ongoing or located in proximity to the front line.

However, the heart of the book lies in the staff’s thoughts, memories, and reflections. Human rights defenders who continued their activities and did not stop assisting those in need are often victims themselves; they are people who live every day in a country where war has been going on for more than four years. This book captures their impressions. The book will be interesting to a wide range of readers, especially those who follow the war in Ukraine.

5. Rendering other kinds of assistance to victims of war crimes: psychological, medical, etc.

In 2025 KHPG centres for psychological assistance for victims of war in Kharkiv Kyiv and Lviv regions continued their activities. In addition, such centre was opened in Mykolaiv. In total, 11 psychologists rendered psychological assistance (4 in Kharkiv, 3 in Lviv, 2 in Kyiv and 2 in Mykolaiv). They counselled by three supervisors, experienced psychologists twice a month. 11 psychologists carried out 4437 one-hour sessions in order to render psychological assistance to 929 victims of war crimes in Kharkiv, Kyiv, Sumy, Mykolaiv and Lviv regions. 221 hours of supervision were conducted. At the end of the year, work with groups started. 36 hours of group consultations were carried out. 12 groups received assistance.

Some of 11 psychologists took part in monitoring visits and rendered urgent psychological assistance. In total, in 2025 psychologists, together with lawyers, made 235 trips, during which psychologists provided urgent psychological assistance to 1,253 crisis patients.

Kharkiv psychologists underwent training and education concerning preparation of psychological opinions based on the Istanbul Protocol on the documenting torture. The trainer was the well-known forensic expert from Dignity Jens Modvig, a former member of the UN Committee against Torture and one of the authors of the Istanbul Protocol. Preparing psychological reports is especially important when there are no traces left on the body of the tortured person after physical torture. As a result, in 2025, Kharkiv psychologists prepared 67 such opinions.

6. Carrying out awareness raising campaign in Ukraine and other countries

Awareness raising campaign engaged dissemination of information daily about:

human rights violations, in particular, violations of national law, international humanitarian law and international criminal law in Ukrainian and English;

the course of military operations in the context of human rights observation in Ukrainian and English.

The campaign also included the following measures:

a. Regular replenishment of the site of the T4P coalition with seven versions in Ukrainian, Russian, English, French, German, Italian, and Spanish; it started in the beginning of September 2022;

b. Disseminating partners’ analytical articles with summarising the war crimes, committed by the Russian military, statements of the T4P coalitions, reports in Ukrainian, Russian, English, French, German, Italian, and Spanish, through T4P site, T4P pages in the Facebook, Twitter, Telegram and YouTube;

c. Creating short clips focused videos about the victims of the war, and on other related topics in Ukrainian, Russian, English, French, German, Italian, and Spanish subtitles, using T4P site, T4P pages in the Facebook, Twitter and YouTube;

d. Regular publication of articles in question on the KHPG and partners organisations' websites and pages in Facebook and Twitter in Ukrainian and in English, translation of part of the publications from English into Ukrainian, Russian, French, German, Italian, and Spanish and dissemination of these translations through T4P coalition website and pages in the Facebook and Twitter;

e. Usage of Facebook ads to spread information on how to inform on war crimes and others, support permanent dialog with visitors of the KHPG pages in the social networks;

f. Demonstration at least two times per month of information video on the Magnolia TV channel, «Suspilne TV» and other TV channels.

KHPG and partners' organisations regularly published daily different materials in Ukrainian and English, such as weekly news reports, descriptions of important cases of crimes committed by Russians, descriptions of political repressions in the temporarily occupied territories analytical articles and reports as well as audio- and video interviews, including interviews in the framework of the project "Voices of War", information on human rights violations from the side of the Ukrainian power. Furthermore, KHPG is probably the only organisation in Ukraine that regularly publishes information about Russian protests against the war in Ukraine. We have published a weekly digest of such protests since mid-March of 2022.

KHPG has created «Voices of War» – recording, transcribing and distributing in Ukrainian and English video interviews both inside and outside of Ukraine from eyewitnesses of the events. 307 interviews in Ukrainian and 216 interviews in English have been made. The planned numbers were both 200 in Ukrainian and English. In addition, 99 short clips for 99 interviews have been made both in Ukrainian and English.

We interview victims and witnesses of war crimes and other people who have something to say about the war — soldiers, volunteers, psychologists, journalists, artists, and musicians. We already collected about three hundred of these interviews on our website and our YouTube channel. They are informative, tell a lot about what is happening in our country, and show the level of mutual assistance and solidarity between Ukrainians. They also demonstrate what kind of terror the Russian military instills in the occupied territories and how brutally they treat peaceful citizens. We translate the best interviews into other languages. Voices of war are now heard in nine languages.

7. Advocacy activities with national authorities, as well as with the ICC, UN, EU, CoE, OSCE, institutions on the basis of the above activities

KHPG and its partners have encrised on efforts to organise bilateral and multilateral meetings between themselves, other Ukrainian partners and international stakeholders, in order to report on the results of documentation efforts, share their analysis and legal qualification of the crimes that have been committed, present evidence and argue for the adoption of resolutions, statements, declarations establishing or prolonging accountability mechanisms and enacting countermeasures – sanctions, to deter future violations.

KHPG experts presented the above analytical products in Warsaw at the OSCE Annual Conference, in Prague at the Forum 2000 conference, in the European Parliament in Brussels, in the Czech Senate, in the Swedish Parliament, in the German Parliament, at meetings in the Foreign Ministries of Germany, Poland, the Czech Republic, Sweden, Belgium, Denmark, and France, at conferences in Germany, the Netherlands, the Czech Republic, Sweden, Denmark, and Estonia.

In 2025, the Kharkiv Human Rights Protection Group or its members were mentioned 228 times in various international and Ukrainian media outlets, according to KHPG's communication registry.

8. KHPG charitable activities

The war forced us to become actively engaged in charity work: it directly affected hundreds of thousands, if not millions, of people. And so, we had to do as much as we could to help them.

In 2025 KHPG has four charity and humanitarian aid programmes. The assistance is provided through the Human and Law Charitable Foundation.

1. Assistance to families in difficult life circumstances and Ukrainian Armed Forces

127 families and 15 legal entities received cash or in-kind assistance.

2. Assistance to convicts serving their sentences in detention facilities

It is well known that the conditions in Ukrainian penitentiary institutions were poor, mainly due to chronic underfunding. After the outbreak of full-scale war, these problems became even more acute. Our programme was launched on July 1, 2022, with the support of the Danish Institute Against Torture DIGNITY (Copenhagen). In 2025 KHPG continued this programme.

In 2025, 45 monitoring visits were carried out to penitentiary institutions.

In addition, 12 ad hoc visits were carried out separately.

The visits covered all regions under the control of the Ukrainian authorities.

The primary goal of the visits was to monitor the provision and observance of human rights during the serving of sentences in penitentiary institutions.

Furthermore, the visits aimed to identify problem areas and pain points in penitentiary institutions and resolve them in partnership with penitentiary administrations. In most cases, this was successful.

The visits and direct communication with inmates allowed for assistance to be provided to 241 inmates.

In particular, we paid for the services of the State Migration Service to produce passports for 178 convicts (from 20 penitentiary establishments) who lost them during the investigation (UAH 484 per passport).

Forty-one interviews were conducted with prisoners who were victims of violence, torture, and inhumane treatment, both by Ukrainian prison administration officials and by Russian and occupation authorities (in relation to those prisoners deported from occupied regions of Ukraine to the Russian Federation and occupied Crimea).

54 prisoners were referred through the referral network established by KHPG for other types of assistance (psychological, social, medical, etc.).

KHPG lawyers provide legal assistance to prisoners in 34 criminal cases.

The visits also resulted in the intensification of the work of the National Preventive Mechanism and assistance in the State Bureau of Investigation's investigation into the most egregious human rights violations (a criminal organization in the Bozhkivska Prison Colony No. 16 in the Poltava region).

3. Charitable assistance to families in difficult circumstances

Another project supported by the Danish Institute Against Torture DIGNITY, among other things, involves the distribution of monetary aid of UAH 3000 to a thousand families. In 2025 400 families have already received such aid.

Only civilians who have been victims of war crimes and human rights violations can receive this aid, namely:
survivors of torture and ill-treatment, including sexual and gender-based violence;
relatives of the perished persons (parents, children, grandparents, spouses, siblings);
persons who suffered due to hostilities;
relatives of missing persons if their disappearance was related to the military conflict;
relatives of prisoners of war or civilians detained by Russians who have not been released;
persons released from captivity;
owners of buildings that are more than 75 percent destroyed (the fourth degree of destruction).

The groups on this list are arranged in order of priority. The highest priority is given to victims of torture, cruel and inhuman treatment, and relatives of persons killed in the military conflict or wounded in the fighting. Among this group, assistance is provided primarily to people with disabilities and serious illnesses, parents and guardians of three or more children, and lonely older adults.

In addition, urgent financial assistance was paid to 68 victims in the amount of UAH 454,300.00 according to standard operating procedures.

4. Charitable assistance to families with a perished civilian member

This program started in February 2024. The program funds amount to SEK 1,666,666, half of the 2022 Nobel Peace Prize awarded to the International Memorial. According to the decision of the Board of the International Memorial, this sum will be transferred to KHPG to help the civilian population affected by the war.

In 2025 KHPG transferred 3000 UAH to 622 families with a perished civilian member.

9. Financial data

In 2025, KHPG turnover amounted to 59 780 800 UAH.
